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INTRODUCTION

•Dearly beloved, we are here today to discuss and learn from some observed behavioural issues that do not speak well of us as believers, workers and ministers.

• This is not to condemn any of us, and no one should feel condemned. It is for us to learn so that we can begin to do things right.

May God help us.

DEFINITION OF ETIQUETTE

•Etiquette is a code of polite conduct, which if practiced properly makes you less likely to offend or annoy people — and you can even charm them.

• Customs or unwritten rules governing behaviour regarded as correct or acceptable in social or official life

• It is not just about table manners in fancy restaurants, but rather expected **behaviors that show respect**, and meant to make everyone feel comfortable.

• Etiquette aligns with 1Tim 3:15: "...that thou mayest know how thou oughtest to BEHAVE THYSELF...".

BIBLICAL CONTEXT OF ETIQUETTE (1 of 2)

""Let all things be done **decently** and **in order**" - 1Cor. 14:40.

• **Decently** - This emphasizes acting in a way that is honorable, respectful, and culturally sensitive.

•In Order - This highlights the need for structure, planning, and organization in how things are done.

BIBLICAL CONTEXT OF ETIQUETTE (2 of 2)

•Beyond Worship - While 1Cor. 14:40 is often applied to church settings, its principle of order and properness extends to all aspects of life, promoting productivity, reducing stress, and aligning with a sense of purpose.

•God's Nature - The emphasis on order reflects a belief that God operates with purpose and structure, and that reflecting that in our actions is a way of honoring Him.

• Avoiding Chaos - The phrase suggests that chaos can be detrimental and that a lack of structure can create confusion and make it harder to focus on what is truly important.

EXAMPLES OF ETIQUETTE ISSUES IN CHURCH (1 of 3)

•Struggling/fighting/striving for food and drinks at events, whether church or social events

•Struggling/fighting/striving for food packs not meant for you. E.g., Workers fighting for Ministers' packs, Ministers fighting for Pastors' packs

•Serving with an entitlement mindset. E.g., asking that palliatives be kept for you even when you are vacationing abroad and not physically around

EXAMPLES OF ETIQUETTE ISSUES IN CHURCH (2 of 3)

•Being dishonest about your personal information just to collect more gifts. For example, writing your names in different ways in multiple departments to make it look like they are different persons

•Collecting more than your fair share/hoarding of gifts and depriving other deserving members from getting theirs

•Openly disobeying the Ushers or Ministers' instructions

•Shouting at/using abusive languages at Church members

EXAMPLES OF ETIQUETTE ISSUES IN CHURCH (3 of 3)

• Pestering other members for financial assistance, while by-passing established Welfare Department's protocols

•Running after event organisers for monies/honorarium promised, not giving room for it to be properly handled

•Serving with an expectation of monetary rewards from the Church

•In fact, **not giving your best service if there is no monetary rewards** attached or will not be noticed/seen by APICR or Parrish Pastor

SOME ADVICE FOR WORKERS AND MINISTERS ABOUT ETIQUETTE (1 of 2)

• Don't do God's work expecting reward from men because God alone is your rewarder.

•Please be patient, avoid haste and do not give a wrong impression about yourself. Don't let your emotions embarrass you.

• Practise "...it's better to give than to receive" by allowing others to be served before you. Know that it doesn't speak well of you to be seen struggling/striving/fighting for food or drinks.

SOME ADVICE FOR WORKERS AND MINISTERS ABOUT ETIQUETTE (2 of 2)

•Please obey instructions amd directives from servants of God knowing that when you do, you are obeying God.

•Plan ahead, anticipate that an event could take longer than planned; if practicable, eat a little before leaving home and do not give room to the devil.

• Make allowance for geneuine mistakes. Be mindful that your conduct/behaviour do not become a source of offense to others.

•Don't be a source of strife, be a peacemaker wherever you are,
